⚠ In many Great Lakes states, the rusty crayfish (*Faxonius rusticus*) is considered widespread and subject to special rules. Retailers generally cannot sell or possess them where they are non-native and restricted.

✗ Live possession is not allowed. Prohibited species are typically banned entirely, but state-specific exceptions may apply. Visit invasivecrayfish.org to find your state's regulations or contact your state's natural resources agency.
